

And if some estimates hold may even hit record lows




Note: 2023 data points represent projections based on city crime trends compiled by the Federal Bureau of Investigation or independent researchers at the Council on Criminal Justice.

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Trends in Retail Theft are a Mixed Bag

The lack of a "national" trend hides a lot of variation

- Significant city-by-city variation, and major "spikes" are real in some cases.
- Organized retail theft is very hard to quantify but there's no reason to believe it has spiked.
- Be very skeptical of any claims based on industry data.





High-Salience Issues: Bail Reform

The data don't support a link between bail reform & crime

- Single and multi-city studies show little to no link between crime and bail reform.
- The best work in New York City shows reform mayactually reduce recidivism in the aggregate.
- But it's important to know how to use this research.





Mid-Salience Issues: The First Step Act

Federal sentencing reforms have been a clear success

- Early research shows relatively low recidivism.
- Compassionate release and home confinement have been broad success stories.
- Advocates in both parties should own that success.
